

Program Logic Models

NOFO: "Include a **logic model** that clearly operationalizes the project's stated theory of change and illustrates the linkages between project activities/services, outputs, and expected outcomes."

Clearly Defined Program

NOFO: "... a program/service must: Be clearly defined and replicable. To meet this criterion, programs and services must have available written protocols, manuals, or other documentation that describes how to implement or administer the practice."

Some example why's.....

- Thinking ahead to the <u>future</u>: *When* you've demonstrated your program works, how can you ensure others will do it correctly?
- Thinking about <u>adaptations:</u> Helps with understanding what and how might need adapting to fit different contexts.


Readiness for (Impact) Evaluation

NOFO: "Applicants must demonstrate that programs and services proposed for evaluation are ready for rigorous summative evaluations, for example by describing formative evaluations that have already been completed."

Formative Outcome Evaluation			Summative (Impact) Evaluation	
You Can Learn:	Is your model well defined and producing outcomes as expected?	If yes, you might be ready for		Are you producing outcomes better than without (your program)?


Readiness for (Impact) Evaluation


NOFO: "Grant recipients are expected to conduct a <u>randomized controlled trial</u> or <u>quasi-experimental design</u> that aligns with the most current version of the Clearinghouse Design and Execution Standards for Moderate or High Support of Causal Evidence."

Leveraging Existing Administrative Data

NOFO: "ACF is particularly interested in evaluations that leverage existing administrative data."

Some example why's.....

- **Time**: data already exist; faster than primary data collection (typically)
- Cost: less expensive than survey or assessments (typically)
- **Outcomes**: available for both treatment and comparison groups

Finding / Partnering with Evaluators

Look for....

- Someone independent of the program
- Someone with experience doing impact evaluations
- Someone who understands the child welfare context
